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Kindergarten Spanish Immersion

This month the students were working on new letters and syllables. They are learning to identify the sounds and connect them to the letters. They can already write sentences! Th students continue to read syllables, words, and short stories!

Ist Grade Spanish Immersion

Students worked on projects for their IB Unit, "Where we are in Place and Time" The units' central idea was, "Environmental features determine how we work and play." Students explored how areas' weather and geographical features affect lifestyles. They were placed in groups, given pages with symbolic buildings, and used scissors, crayons and markers, to create their own communities. The project offers many learning points for the students; they are developing their social skills through communicating, collaborating, and negotiating what items should got on their project. They are developing their critical thinking skills as they discuss the things they had learned about nutrition, and decide which foods belonged on a plate that is called healthy. They are being creative as they draw their food items on their posters. And in the end, when they presented their projects to their classmates and explained the reasons behind the foods they selected, they are reflecting on what they have learned from the unit. These are some of the many benefits of having students create end-of-unit projects. And the photos of the students working on their projects together show how much they are engaged in what they are doing, and what they learned.

Middle School Spanish Immersion

During this high-energy dance assembly students learn contemporary and old school Hip Hop moves and valuable lessons about positivity, fairness, working together, acceptance, and communication. Illstyle acts out scenarios that place two school groups against one another in day-to-day life, and finally in a dance-off. With the help of a dedicated teacher, the students soon come together, discovering that they are more alike than they are different.

















News from the French Immersion Program

Kindergarten-Ist Grade French Immersion

On Friday, January 14, BIA West switched to virtual learning due to the surge of Covid. Kindergarten and First Grade French Immersion classes used to send a weekly packet related to a day-by-day class lessons taught and activities linked to those lessons to students. To help parents support their children, the first page of the packet is always in English. Also, to make sure students never miss it, the hard copy of the packet is inserted into students "backpacks."

Based on the January IB profile "Communicator," teachers used the Zoom platform to get students focus on everything that was taught; during the 5 days of online class, class always started with their routine: greeting students and asking them to greet each other so that they can interact. After greetings, the class began with Language Arts reading, writing and listening. Students watched a video about some means of communication. After the videos, there were class discussions based on the inquiries the teachers asked about what they'd observed in the videos. The discussions, reading and writing activities helped students discover build their vocabulary.

















2nd Grade French Immersion

The students learned that people have different celebrations around the year. Even people who celebrate Christmas don't all celebrate it the same way. One of the students chose India as a project and learned that in India, Santa is called charismas Baba. Another student chooses to search francophones countries like Suisse and Belgium and found out that Santa is called Saint Nicholas. Students compared the foods for celebrations of the countries they chose, like México, where they make Galette des Rois Rosca de Reyes. One of the students wondered if children got choked by the surprise (coin, toy) they will find in the special cake. We learned many new things and had good discussions during this unit.

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Being a "Communicator"

In September, we highlighted the Learner Profile attribute of being Caring, in October the focus was on being an Inquirer, and in November, we highlighted the Learner Profile Attribute of being Open-Minded. During December, our focus was on being Principled, and we started 2022 with focusing on **being Communicators**:

"Students who are **Communicators** express their ideas by speaking, writing, using mathematical notation, and through art. They effectively listen and respond in meaningful ways. They can also speak and write in more than one language."

Students focused on improving their listening skills through activities with their teachers. They also had discussions about which words are appropriate to use in school settings. How might those be different than those used with friends and/or family?
